

Unit: Who am I?

Term: Autumn 2

Year: 1



Unit Overview

Every child is special and each one has his or her own particular skills, fascinations and potential.

Throughout this Unit, pupils will have the opportunity to express their individuality, explore their identity, develop their talents and understand their place in both their immediate and the wider world.

Key questions that will be explored include:

- Who am I?
- Where did my name come from?
- What am I like?
- What am I good at?
- What is special about me?
- Where do I live?

The Unit starts with a mystery box, the contents of which represent someone (Head Teacher or volunteer) who will be visiting the class later in the lesson. Pupils examine the contents of the box and act as detectives, framing questions to find out more about the owner of the box, who in due course arrives and reveals the reasons for his/her choice of objects. This gives pupils further opportunity to ask questions and prepare to make their own special memory boxes.

Throughout the Unit pupils can take on the role of detectives, finding out about themselves and their lives. The teacher is encouraged to use a decorated box to introduce many of the lessons in this Unit, with pupils in role as detectives framing questions or solving problems relating to objects or information in the box.

The linked maths lessons see pupils solve problems related to special objects that are stored in the box and in it is also a focal point of English lessons, where initially a special poem 'Who am I? is revealed, with pupils again acting as detectives to explore and understand the poem. In art they explore their own interests and personality which is going to be reflected in the decoration of a special box about them. They will also be encouraged to think about their own identity and character by designing a collage and personalised name plate for use in the classroom, before attempting a self-portrait. They will also discover and hopefully develop their own singing voice in music.

Detective work continues in history where pupils explore their place in the world by using their family to discover what school life was like in the past, making them think about their lives now compared to those of earlier generations.

Art and Design

- Images showing a variety of name plates
- Prepared version of a name plate (your own or an example from another class)

- Images of other decorated, themed boxes from various cultures and ages in various materials e.g. medieval carved ivory casket, wooden sea chest, jewellery box, Bible box, Chinese tea caddy, hat box, cardboard shoe-box, regency lady's writing box etc
- Role-play area: traditional storytelling area, classroom from the past, post office

Music
